A Brief History on The Infinite Wonders of the World

Stonehenge

The great mystery that is the construction and purpose of Stonehenge has helped it rise to one of the most famous prehistoric monuments in Europe. Located in Wiltshire England, Stonehenge was built in a few phases. The first phase took place in the Neolithic period (~2500 BCE). Builders dug a huge circular “henge” which is where *Stonehenge* got its name. A henge is a big ring-shaped mound that kind of looks like a big bowl in the ground. Inside the henge were some pits called the Aubrey Holes that probably held some big totem-pole-like posts. They are called the Aubrey Holes because a dude named John Aubrey discovered them so only naturally he would name them after himself.

In the second phase (~2200 BCE) the builders placed around 80 bluestones from 200 miles away in a circle. Now, there are only 43 left. This is because some have been stolen throughout the years by greedy thieves. Why you would want to steal a 4 ton rock, I don’t know. The third phase (~2000 BCE) was when the sarsen sandstone rocks were placed in the outermost circle. Some were placed in a trilithon which is the structure of one horizontal slab placed on top of two “leg” slabs. These rocks were from only 25 miles away. I guess they got a little lazier after a few hundred years.

What makes Stonehenge so interesting was that it was built before the wheel was invented. This has led to some... creative theories. In 1620, George Villier, 1st Duke of Buckingham, tried to search for buried treasure so he dug a hole in the middle of the henge. Spoiler alert, there was no treasure. In the Middle Ages, because rational thinking was not yet invented, people believed that Merlin the wizard built Stonehenge. Also something about giants and magical African stones, I don’t even know. I think it’s safe to say that story probably isn’t correct. John Aubrey thought that ancient druids built it but carbon dating shows that the structure was built before the Celts even existed. Modern historians theorize that it was actually just built by a few different tribes because the location of Stonehenge appears to be the border or meeting point between what a cluster of indigenous tribes believed to be their territories. They might have used sledges and rollers to move the stones and then floated them along the Welsh coast up the River Avon. But what really happened, we may never know.

ARTISTS AND GRAPHIC DESIGNERS

Dustin Neece

Dustin is a painter of landscapes and portraits. Dustin owns [his own business](#) where he sells his art and offers lessons (on-line and in person). In the interview Dustin discusses many aspects of his art and how to make art a business. He talks about his artistic approach, his philosophies about art, how to manage a business selling art, his education and training, what high school students can do to get started and the earning potential. Katie Wilson

Katie is a graphic designer and has been with [Saucony](#) (a company that makes athletic shoes and clothing) for 7 years and is currently the Senior Graphic Designer where she works on advertising with the marketing team. In the interview, Katie shows examples of her ads for Saucony and describes her design process as well as things she needs to take into consideration for international ads. Katie also shares the rewards/challenges of her job, the program at Roger Williams, the option of certification programs (Mass Art) and skills needed. Katie also discusses the value of starting out by taking temp to perm jobs, identifies some current graphic artists that are influencing her work and talks about what students can do to get a leg up in the field.

Jamison Wright

Jamison owns his own design company and focuses his work on logos (brand development) and website design. During the interview Jamison shows an example of a logo he developed and the design process as well as a website and its design process. Jamison talks about his influences, how he keeps learning, challenges of owning his own business, the program at Mass. College of Art and Design, what to look for in a program, emerging specialties, earning potential, entry level jobs, the software he uses and what high school students can do to get started in their career. Audrey Ficociello Dallmeyer

Audrey is an illustrator who sells her illustrations and has illustrated several children's books. Audrey discusses her design process, style, influences, her work illustrating children's books (finding publishers), selling online and how she gets her ideas. She also talks about getting into the field of illustrations, the types of work illustrators can do (medical illustrations, graphic novels, gaming industry and more), what to look for in a college program and how she uses math. Amanda Faucher

Amanda owns her own graphic design business ([AB Designs](#)) in Hopkinton. Amanda shares her career path (moving from fine arts to graphic design), the type of designs she does, her design process, what to look for in a college program, emerging specialties, how to find clients including international clients, how to stay current with national and international trends, how to build a portfolio, the importance of presenting designs that are unique, Youtube certified tutorials on products such as Adobe Illustrator, utilizing artist networking groups and designing within the parameters or guidelines of a given company.

A group of HHS baseball players spent their Friday afternoon volunteering at Daniel's Table, a non-profit food pantry in Framingham, cleaning up and landscaping.

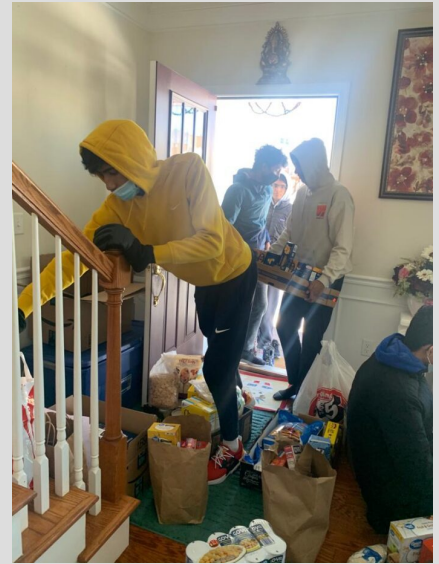

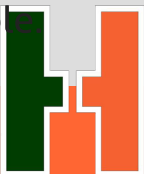

Our Mission & Vision

The Hopkinton Emergency Fund is a private, 501c3 nonprofit organization whose mission is to provide temporary emergency financial assistance to residents of Hopkinton through collaboration with existing local human service organizations.

A united Hopkinton community that recognizes its responsibility to support residents when they are faced with emergencies by providing financial assistance to meet their basic needs.

Why Hopkinton Emergency Fund and what do we help with?

There is a wide variety of specific needs for which we can provide funds. Examples include, but are not limited to, essential household items, emergency car repairs, housing related expenses, and medical care.

How does the process work?

If a service organization is unable to provide someone with financial assistance for a specific need either individually or by splitting the cost as a group, they will submit a referral form to us that explains the situation and amount needed. Our grant committee will review the application and if accepted, will write a check directly to the business vendor who is performing the service for the person in need.
